

FIGHTING RURAL CRIME ACROSS ESSEX

- ▶ Rural Crime is a key priority in the Police and Crime Plan 2016-2020
- ▶ Nearly three quarters of Essex is rural
- ▶ Rural areas require a different style of policing



WHAT IS RURAL CRIME?

There is no centralised definition of Rural Crime but, following consultation with our partners, we will consider Rural Crime to be:

Any crime committed in a rural location, or where the victim is specifically targeted because of their connection to, or involvement in, the rural community, economy, or area.



This strategy seeks to incorporate all types of crime and wider issues that have a significant impact on rural communities such as:

Anti-Social Behaviour	Assaults	Wildlife Crime
Fly-Tipping	Hare Coursing	Damage/ Arson/ Vandalism
Dwelling Burglary	Drug and Substance Misuse	Fear of Crime / Personal Safety / Harassment
Theft from Outbuildings	Forced Labour/ Slavery	Racial Harassment and Intimidation

OUR VISION

Our vision is to actively strengthen our response to fighting crime in rural areas through the effective use of policing resources, partnerships and working with our rural communities.

OUR AIMS

- ▶ to reduce the volume of crime and anti-social behaviour in rural areas
- ▶ to continue bringing offenders to justice
- ▶ to increase public confidence in Essex Police

We will work with our partners and rural communities of Essex to ensure solutions meet identified local problems, fully supporting victims of crime and improving crime prevention.



WHAT WILL ESSEX POLICE DO?

By clearly defining rural crime we will be able to fully understand the volume, distribution, nature and frequency of offences across Essex and focus our resources into the areas of greatest need and develop innovative solutions to tackle the issues.

Through focused, visible policing at a local level, our Gypsy, Traveller and Rural Engagement Team (GTRET), Crime Prevention Team and Community Policing Teams will:

- ▶ reassure rural communities
- ▶ deter crime
- ▶ gather (and share) intelligence
- ▶ bring to justice those who commit crimes in rural areas
- ▶ offer advice and support, and develop crime prevention plans
- ▶ develop the Farm and Rural Watch network
- ▶ work with neighbouring forces
- ▶ host Rural Crime Awareness events
- ▶ work with key partners and the community

HOW CAN YOU HELP?

REPORT CRIME AND SUSPICIOUS ACTIVITY

It is vital to report all crimes. If we can't measure it we can't manage it.

We need information to target resources and develop intelligence

If you see anything suspicious or a crime occurring and it is happening **there and then**, ring **999**

WHAT WE NEED YOU TO TELL US

Do not place yourself at any risk

Remember: Who, What, Where, When, Why and How?

- ▶ **Who** you are (**name/ address/ contact** details) **and...**
Who is committing the crime/ acting suspiciously (if known)? Or a **description**, including any **vehicle details** and **registration number** and a **direction of travel** if they have left
- ▶ **What** is happening/ happened, **what** have you actually seen/ heard?
- ▶ **Where** this is occurring and **where** are you (as detailed as possible including **postcode** or **landmarks**)?
- ▶ **When** this happened (time if possible or an idea of how long ago)?
- ▶ **Why** this happened? / **Why** are you suspicious?
- ▶ **How** did it occur? / **How** was the crime committed?

HOW CAN YOU GET INVOLVED?



Active Citizens: Are you able to volunteer to assist us in a wide range of roles in the community, by promoting crime prevention messages and supporting local teams to deliver accessible, visible policing?

WHO IS HELPING TO KEEP YOU SAFE?

Community Policing Teams (CPTs): there are 10 CPTs operating across Essex made up of Police Officers, Police Community Support Officers and Special Constabulary under the command of an Inspector. Working closely with the 14 Community Safety Partnership teams, Local Authorities, other emergency services, health providers and charities, the CPTs engage with their communities, gather information and resolve local problems. They work closely with:

Community Safety Hubs: these are locally based working partnerships between key agencies and local groups responsible for the delivery of the Local Community Safety Partnership Plan. We are working with local CSPs to establish Community Safety Hubs within each policing district. The Hubs will provide an enhanced service to the local community by ensuring public service organisations, voluntary services and business partners work intelligently together to tackle priorities identified by the local community and recorded within the Community Safety Plan.

Local Policing Support Unit (LPSU): based at Headquarters, the LPSU is the team with the responsibility for the strategic and tactical development of work including Crime Prevention, Anti-Social Behaviour, Children and Young People, Gypsy & Traveller engagement, Wildlife & Heritage Crime and partnership work.

The Gypsy, Traveller and Rural Engagement Team (GTRET) is a county-wide resource, consisting of 1 Sergeant and 4 Constables which works with rural communities and partners to reduce crime and anti-social behaviour through the delivery of activity such as Operations Buzzard (the overarching activity to address crime in rural communities) and Galileo (tackling hare coursing).
